## From The Pastor's Printer

IT WAS QUITE A FEAST! ~ Many, many thanks to all who worked to make our turkey dinner a great feast, and the craft show a great success. I saw new faces working in the kitchen, the tables, and the dishwasher. I am grateful that I saw so many teens and tweens working as well. I think everyone had a great time, except the turkey. To quote Tiny Tim (the kid in Dickens' story, not the weird singer guy), "God bless us, one and all."

KNOWING WHO YOU SERVE AT MASS ~ Moving from the turkey table to THE TABLE —the altar of the Lord, I want to remind, invite, urge, exhort liturgical ministers to come to the Morning of Reflection this Saturday (More details in this bulletin.) One might wonder why he or she should attend such a day; after all, reading, greeting, "ushing," singing, and distributing Holy Communion are not all that complex. But the ministries are not primarily about doing things; they are about serving our God in the context of his most intimate act with us, speaking with us and feeding us with the Body and Blood of His Son. We are not there like hired help to serve; we are his cherished sons and daughter assisting Him in this deepest act of love. To know Him better is to serve Him better! Hope to see you there.

KNOWING HIM WHO YOU SERVE IN THE WORLD ~ And moving from the altar to the world, we go from the Lord's table to the world's table where many do not seem to have a plate before them or food to put on it. Jesus tells us that these people are Him! Christ feeds us with His very Self so that we can go and feed others. This is not meant to be just a feeding for day, but the reordering of the lives of the poor so that they can be lifted out of poverty. Next Sunday is the collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development. The funds raised go to projects which provide opportunities for employment, education, and direction in communities which lack these essential needs. We might complain that the poor should get off their duffs and do something. While this is a extremely simplistic statement, the CCHD offers the "something" needed to move out of poverty. Pope Francis, quite in accord with Catholic social teaching dating back to Pope Leo XIII in the late 1800 and the action of saints for six centuries, has called the Church to remember that our mission is to enable people to live with the dignity that is their right by virtue of their being human. EXCEPT FOR DONATIONS IN THE REGULAR SUNDAY COLLECTION ENVELOPES, THE REST WILL GO FOR THE CCHD.

IN LIGHT OF TODAY'S GOSPEL (MT: 25: 14-30)... ~ When I look at the confidence and initiative of so many kids today, I often think of what I buried in my youth because I did not have the confidence or sense of initiative to do more than sit around and wish there was something to do. As I have grown order, I ask myself if I am looking for opportunities to serve God as a priest and pastor, or if I am willing to settle with "nothing's on fire and the police are not at the door, so all must be okay." I must look to see if I am doing all that God calls me to do here and now to further the kingdom. Probably each of us needs to take time to look at our everyday lives (or even in more dramatic ways) and see what opportunities are facing us to make the kingdom of God grow. Cemeteries are for the bodies of our beloved dead, not a place to bury the opportunities God offers for his kingdom to bloom.

## DID YOU KNOW?

...that <u>five seconds is the average time your eyes are</u> off the road while texting. When traveling at 55 mph, that's enough time to cover the length of a football field blindfolded.

...that statistics show that the dangers of distracted driving are deadly. Talking on the cell phone quadruples your risk of an accident, about the same as if you were driving drunk. That risk doubles again to eight times if you are texting. There are three types of distractions: Manual, visual and cognitive. Texting involves all three!

...that there are 10 tips for managing some of the common distractions:

- 1. X the text.
- 2. Turn your phone off and stow It.
- 3. Ask your passengers to make a call or text.
- 4. Don 't multi-task behind the wheel.
- 5. Secure pets.
- 6. Pull over to a safe place to address situations involving the children.
- 7. Spread the word.
- 8. Know the state and local laws about the use of cell phones/texting.
- 9. Prepare map/route directions ahead.
- Pull over for anything that may distract your focus on driving.

...that in a recent study 25% of teens reported that they responded to a text message once or more almost every time they drive. 20% of teens and 10% of parents admit they have had extended, multi-message text conversations while driving.

...that you can get your blood pressure checked in the Community Room after the 9:00 a.m. Mass on Sunday, November 16<sup>th</sup>, and after the 11:00 a.m. Mass on Sunday, November 23<sup>rd</sup>.





"Within the cycle of a year . . . the Church unfolds the whole mystery of Christ"

(Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, 102)

Through the seasons and feasts of the liturgical year, the Church "unfolds the whole mystery of Christ." Notice that the Council Fathers did not say "mysteries," but "mystery."

We do not celebrate a different mystery at Christmas than at Easter. Rather, we celebrate different aspects of the Paschal Mystery. At Christmas, we celebrate "the beginnings of our redemption" in the Incarnation of Christ (*The Roman Missal*, Prayer at the Vigil Mass of Christmas). At Easter, we celebrate the fullness of redemption in the Lord's Resurrection. In the feasts of the saints, we honor those who died with Christ and who now share in his eternal life. In the feasts of the Blessed

Virgin Mary, we honor the first disciple of Christ, who participates in a special way in God's plan for our salvation. Through the rich prayers and traditions of the liturgical year, the central mystery of our faith—the Paschal Mystery—is revealed to us.


