This Week's Bible Verse

“You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself.” – Matthew 22:37-39

Today's Lesson, Chapter 6: The Liturgical Year

We learn that throughout the liturgical year we remember and celebrate Jesus Christ.

- Just like we have a calendar year, we also have a church year, called a “liturgical year”. Throughout the cycle of the liturgical year we celebrate the entire life of Jesus. The first day of the liturgical year is the first day of Advent; the last day of the liturgical year is the last day of Ordinary Time following Easter. This year, the first day of the liturgical year (and Advent) is Sunday, November 29.
- Read chapter 6, on pages 60 – 62. Don't skip the liturgical year on page 61!
- Now return to page 61 and the liturgical year.
 - What season of the church year is being celebrated right now? (*Hint: It's the long stretch between Easter and Christmas.*)
 - Mary had a very special role in the life of Jesus. In the Catholic Church we even dedicate the entire month of May to Mary! And the month of October is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary, which honors Mary as well.
 - The saints are honored throughout the year on their feast days. Who is the patron saint of our parish? (*Hint: It's the name of our church.*) Saint John the Baptist is the patron saint of our church. His feast day is June 24, which is why we usually try to hold our summer festival around that time.
 - We even celebrate all of the saints together on All Saints Day (November 1st each year). All Saints Day is a Holy Day of Obligation, which means as Catholics we attend Mass to help celebrate this important day.





