The Energy Of God, The Holy Spirit

Wind, fire, and words which defied the limitation of language, all served on the first day of the week, the feast of Pentecost, to shake up the world with the good news – the Gospel – of the mighty acts of God. Would that we should see and hear such wonders! Maybe it would enlighten us to the great gifts of love, salvation, and eternal life that God has bestowed upon us. Maybe it would wake up people who live with low expectations of the world (as a place where cynicism, hatred, fear, and violence have already won the fight) of the future (nothing good will develop, we are on the slide to the sinkhole of destruction), and of themselves (I am who I am, I cannot change, the world has dealt me blows; I cannot heal).
