NOTES

Psalm 34 is a song of thanksgiving, expressing themes of wisdom literature. It has many uses in the liturgy. The 23 verses of the psalm are set to 13 musical verses, and four different refrains are provided. The appointed uses for Psalm 34 in the *Lectionary for Mass*, Volume I (for Sundays, Solemnities, Feasts of the Lord and the Saints, 1998 revision) are as follows:

- 4th Sunday of Lent, Cycle C (Lect. #33): Refrain A, verses 1, 2, 3.
- 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B (Lect. #116): Refrain A, verses 1, 2, 3, 4.
- 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B (Lect. #119): Refrain A, verses 1, 2, 3.
- 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B (Lect. #122): Refrain A, verses 1, 8, 10, 12.
- 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle C (Lect. #150): Refrain C, verses 1, 9, 11.
- Common psalm during Ordinary Time (Lect. #174, 16): Either Refrain A or B, verses 1, 2, 3, 4.
- June 29: SS. Peter and Paul, apostles, Mass During the Day (Lect. #591): Refrain D, verses 1, 2, 3, 4.

Other appointed uses of Psalm 34 include Common of Martyrs, Common of Saints, Marriage, Holy Eucharist, and Sacred Heart. The Psalm is often used on weekdays, as well as during the Liturgy of the Hours. Psalm 34 is always an appropriate choice during the communion procession at Mass, particularly with Refrain A.

Musically, the setting may simply be performed with only assembly, cantor, and keyboard. Although organ is preferred, the keyboard part may be played on the piano, and guitar chords are provided to allow the setting to be used with "contemporary ensembles." The optional instrumentation and choir parts provide an added dimension. If instrumentation is used, creativity is encouraged by varying the musical texture, as all instruments do not have to be used each time a refrain or verse is sung.
